

Challenges Facing Greater Atlanta and OUR Communities

The primary factors that drive our work at the Urban League are:

- The State of Georgia has the 3rd highest poverty rate in the nation and is rated as one of the hardest states to move out of poverty.
- The State of Georgia continues to rank among the highest ten states in unemployment in the nation at 5.4 percent as of December 2016. The unemployment rate for African Americans is estimated at almost twice that rate or higher.
- Last year, Georgia graduated 79 percent of its high school students. This
 is compared to 60-62 percent of Black and Hispanic students who
 graduate in Georgia within four years. Only 49 percent of Black males
 graduate from high school in Georgia.
- Georgia has a "skills gap" in our workforce. Georgia has thousands of unfilled jobs because companies cannot find workers with the needed skill sets.
- Georgia incarcerates more people per capita than 44 other states and the majority of them are African American. Of the men incarcerated in Georgia in 2013, 61 percent were African American, while blacks constitute 31 percent of Georgia's population.





History of the Urban League Movement

- **Founded in 1910** in New York City to support African American families migrating from rural communities to urban centers as a result of racial discrimination and the dawn of the industrial revolution.
- Three inter-racial non-profit organizations created to support migrating families decided to merge, led by the "odd couple" Ruth Standish and George Haynes, and created what we now know as the National Urban League.
- **Urban League Movement** has grown to 88 affiliates in 35 states and the District of Columbia across the country led by Marc Morial, National President.





Our Mission, Vision and Program Areas of Focus

Our Mission is to enable and empower African Americans and others in underserved communities to achieve their highest potential and secure economic self-reliance, parity, power and civil rights. **Our Vision** is for all youth, adults and families in Georgia to have the skills, tools and access to be economically empowered to earn a middle class wage or better and move up the economic ladder toward success.

ULGA Focused on Solutions Our Approach

The Urban League strategy is to tackle the challenges in three ways:

- **Prevention**: Our high school **Project Ready Program** supports students "at promise" to complete high school on time, ready for college, careers and life.
- Intervention: Our Urban Youth Empowerment Program (UYEP) supports out of school and unemployed young adults 18-24 to earn secondary and post-secondary education credentials and explore and identify high demand career pathways; Youth Build supports high school dropouts to earn GED credentials and a Construction Worker Certificate and go on to earn stackable credentials in welding, carpentry, HVAC, plumbing, painting and apprenticeships.
- Reintegration: Our Pathways 2 Empowerment, Training 2
 Work Adult Reentry and New Beginnings programs equip the longterm unemployed, professionals that have been laid off, people with
 barriers to employment and those returning from incarceration to
 gain job skills and enter or re-enter the workforce "job ready" and in
 pursuit of high demand careers.

Our ULGA Services for Opportunity/At Promise Youth

Youth are our Future.....and too many are in CRISIS, which is why the Urban League of Greater Atlanta is focused on supporting our "opportunity" youth to get the support they need to achieve their highest potential and achieve their dreams. Target Population: 14 – 24 year olds.

ULGA Youth Programs:

- Project Ready: supports high school students to graduate on time, ready for college, careers and life. Where: Benjamin E. Mays H. S. and Booker T. Washington H.S.
- Urban Youth Empowerment Program RISE: supports out of school youth connected to the juvenile system to gain credentials, secure employment and life skills.
- YouthBuild: supports out of school 16 24 year-olds to earn a GED, Construction Certificate, secure employment and life skills.

All youth engage in community service and mentoring activities.





Our ULGA Services for Building Wealth, Homeownership & Entrepreneurship

Building Wealth – To build wealth, you need an understanding of how to manage money, save, invest, maintain a solid credit score and manage risk. The ULGA offers financial literacy workshops to support youth and adults to obtain these skills and knowledge.

Homeownership – One of the ways to build wealth is to own a home. The ULGA is a HUD Certified Housing Agency that offers:

- First-time Homebuyer Workshops Monthly
- Pre and Post Home Purchase Counseling
- Foreclosure Intervention Counseling
- Affordable and Transitional Housing Assistance & Referrals

Entrepreneurship — Most adults have two choices of ways to generate income: 1) working for an employer 2) owning a business. ULGA operates The Entrepreneurship Center to support aspiring entrepreneurs to launch and existing business owners to grow their small business through:

- Small Business Development Workshops
- Small Business Coaching with a focus on:
 - Access to Contracts
 - Access to Capital





Advocacy, Health, Volunteering & Civic Engagement

The ULGA serves as an advocate for education, health, volunteering and civic engagement. We support these platforms through the following initiatives:

Volunteers: The ULGA utilizes volunteers in all of our programs to engage the community, support our programs, serve as mentors, coaches and voter registrants. We also support our partners by serving as volunteers.

Education Equity: The ULGA partners with the Georgia Coalition for the Peoples Agenda, the Center for Pan Asian Community Services, NAACP Atlanta Branch Education Committee and other partners to be advocates for equity in education relative to legislative and policy issues, parent engagement and support, and teacher and student advocacy.

Civic Engagement: ULGA is an advocate for civic engagement and engages in voter registration and voter education activities. We also support our civil rights partners in their civic engagement activities.

Community Outreach: Engages in a variety of activities to connect the community with ULGA programs and services.

Project Wellness Young Mothers & Fathers –to- be: ULGA sponsors a program to support young mothers and fathers to be to understand preand post- natal care, parenting skills, job readiness and life skills.
