Dr. Leroy Wright, Jr.

Pastor, First Thessalonian Missionary Baptist Church

Dr. Leroy Wright, Jr. is the pastor of 1st Thessalonian Missionary Baptist Church whose vision is Empowered by God, to Embrace all people and Enhance the world. Dr. Leroy Wright, Jr., received his early education in Savannah, Georgia.

He received his Bachelor of Arts Degree from Morehouse College, and the Master of Divinity and the Doctor of Theology in Pastoral Counseling from the Interdenominational Theological Center (ITC) in Atlanta, Georgia. He is a psychoanalytic therapist, providing psychotherapy to individuals, couples and groups, certified Chaplain and a registered neutral (mediator) in the State of Georgia.

Dr. Wright served as Special Programs and Field Placement Coordinator and adjunct Professor at ITC. He has a wide variety of other work experiences. Previous capacities include Trinity Community Ministers as the Business Manager; Flair Vending Corporation as CEO; the Atlanta Police Department as a Patrolman; the United States Army as a Sergeant; Emory Center for Pastoral Services as a Chaplain; Georgia Association of Pastoral Care (currently Counseling, Care, Center of Georgia); Ben Hill United Methodist Church as a Pastoral Counselor; Wells of Wholeness as a Psychotherapist; and St. Stephen Missionary Baptist Church as an Associate Minister.

Some of his organizational affiliations are: Member of the Fulton County Community Development Corporation Advisory Board; Past President, English Avenue/Vine City Ministerial Alliance; Former Member-American Association of Pastoral Counselors; Magic Toastmasters; and Charter Member, Afro-American Patrolman League, Atlanta, Georgia.

Dr. Wright is married (wife-Bettie) and is a father of two daughters (Erica & Andrea) and one son (David).

Deitra Crawley

Deitra Crawley represents corporate clients in regulatory matters, government contracts and other transactional issues in the U.S. and abroad. Ms. Crawley's regulatory practice includes corporate compliance, government contracts, international trade, data rights protections and certifications for small businesses and veteran-owned enterprises. She navigates Federal regulations, designs and implements custom-tailored compliance programs pursuant to various Federal compliance requirements including FCPA, OFAC, ITAR, EAR, and OFCCP, offers counsel to defense and other government contractors in all aspects of government contracting under FAR, DFARS, DCAA, and DCMA, advises clients in enforcement actions including FCPA, OFAC, U.S. Department of State and U.S. Customs and Border Protection enforcement actions, performs compliance due diligence in mergers and acquisitions, and counsels foreign governments on domestic practices and laws.

Her practice focuses on domestic and foreign procurements, export controls, foreign military sales, foreign government regulations, bid protests, government audits and investigations, claims and appeals before administrative boards and agencies, and procurement fraud claims.

Prior to joining Taylor English, Ms. Crawley was general counsel for privately held corporations in the metro Washington, D.C., area where she managed compliance, advised in contract disputes, guided companies on a wide range of international trade matters and led negotiations with Lockheed Martin Corporation on behalf of her client resulting in a \$192 million merger.

Ms. Crawley then launched an international legal and business consulting firm in D.C., and later joined a government contracts and international trade boutique law firm in Huntsville, Alabama, that focused on defense industry clients. Her legal work encompassed matters in South Africa, Croatia, Kazakhstan, Turkey, Turkmenistan, Russia, the United Arab Emirates, the European Union and

Australia. Ms. Crawley's endeavors in South Africa, post-Apartheid, were particularly impactful in nation building and development. Sent by the United States Agency for International Development (USAID), she trained South Africans on how to make progress in local democracy. Ms. Crawley was an integral part of a team that held training sessions for the men and women of South Africa, and managed peer exchanges with local governments, as well as city and county managers in the U.S.

Ms. Crawley builds teams consisting of U.S. business and investors and facilitates the in-country partnerships. In 2016, she organized a Cuba Opportunity Forum, where more than 50 Atlanta-area companies participated in dialogue on Cuba's needs and the opportunities for doing business in Cuba. She will lead an Atlanta-Cuba Direct Investment

Exchange, when key government officials in Cuba will continue the conversation with Atlanta-based businesses about cross-investment opportunities. A cornerstone of Ms. Crawley's practice is her ability to counsel businesses in the incubator phase in securing financing and obtaining U.S. and foreign government business partnerships.

Ms. Crawley has represented the environmental cleanup and liability interests of local governments and local communities before the Administration and Congress, particularly where base closures, nuclear sites closures and abandoned and Superfund sites exist. She has facilitated the convening of Local Redevelopment Authorities in EPA Regions 2, 4, and 6, and has served on a Local Redevelopment Authority in Washington, D.C.

Ms. Crawley has made presentations on government contracts, data rights protections and international trade to the National Contract Management Association, North Alabama International Trade Association, Global Ties Alabama, Auburn University College of Business and Alabama State University College of Business.

In 2012 Faye was promoted to Scoutreach Director and in 2013 she assumed the additional responsibility of Field Director in the Atlanta Area Council. Faye currently serves as the Asst. Director of Field Service and Director of Scoutreach. In that role she manages 13 Program Specialists and provides oversight of the Scouting Outreach Program. She often states that she has had many career opportunities, but none as fulfilling and rewarding as her current role. She is committed to delivering quality programs to youth throughout the community and works diligently to ensure that she honors that commitment.

Dr. Margul Retha Woolfolk

Principal, M. Agnes Jones Elementary School

Margul Retha Woolfolk is the proud principal of the magnificent M. Agnes Jones Elementary School in the Atlanta Public Schools System. M. AGNES JONES is the FIRST and only GADOE STEM certified school in the Atlanta Public Schools System! AND NOW....the FIRST traditional GADOE STEAM certified school in the Atlanta Public Schools System!

She ensures high academic success for 580 Pre-K thru 5th grade urban students. Her mission is to provide a rigorous and high quality learning environment for students by affording scholars learning opportunities that promote critical thinking and the assurance of becoming college and career ready to successfully compete in a global society. She was awarded the Atlanta Public Schools Stellar Principal Award (May, 2016). Most recently, Dr. Woolfolk was recognized by the Georgia Department of Education for her visionary guidance and exceptional leadership in advancing STEM and STEAM education in Georgia Schools (October, 2018). Additionally, she serves on the board of directors for the Atlanta Girls on the Run.

Some of the initiatives Margul Retha has implemented while serving as the principal of M. Agnes Jones include:

- 1) Earning a Pre-K through fifth grade GADOE Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) Certification as well as one in STE(A-arts)M for students who have traditionally been underserved and under exposed to the content areas and the arts in a practical and relevant way.
- 2) Earning several GADOE "Beating the Odds" awards for M. Agnes Jones.
- 3) Challenging Atlanta Public Schools' nutrition department to have a salad bar to expose students to healthy eating. M. Agnes was the first elementary school to obtain a salad bar and other schools followed this initiative.

- 4) Encouraging an Alpha Kappa Alpha Nu Lambda Omega asthma prevention program to help students who have chronic asthma to recognize the triggers and find ways to prevent asthma attacks.
- 5) Mentoring not only students at M. Agnes Jones but mentoring and providing professional development to students attending schools in the Atlanta University Center, including Spelman, Morehouse and Clark Atlanta University as well as Georgia State University.
- 6) Working tirelessly with West End Community groups to provide support and assistance to students and families, i.e. Choice Neighborhood, Atlanta Housing Authority, United Way, Atlanta Food Bank.
- 7) Serving as a part-time instructor at Georgia State University where real-world connections are embedded in teaching Literacy in the Content Areas.

Margul Retha is married to Ralph McKinley Woolfolk III. She has three adult sons and two granddaughters.

Margul Retha is a member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., Nu Lambda Omega Chapter.

Margul Retha graduated with a B. A. in Economics from Spelman College and earned both a Masters and Specialist of Education degree with honors from Georgia State University. Additionally, she earned a Doctor of Philosophy in Language and Literacy at Georgia State University.

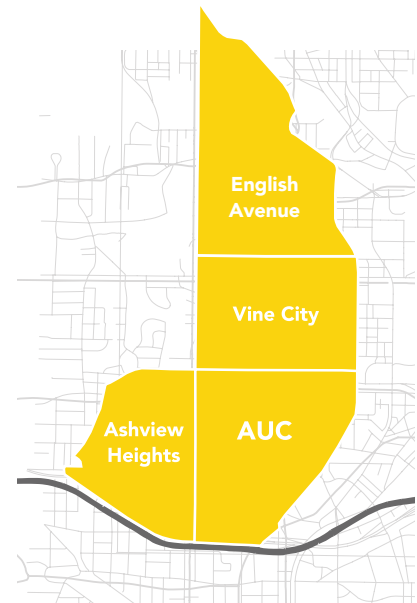
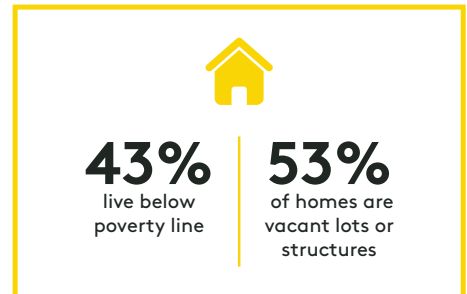
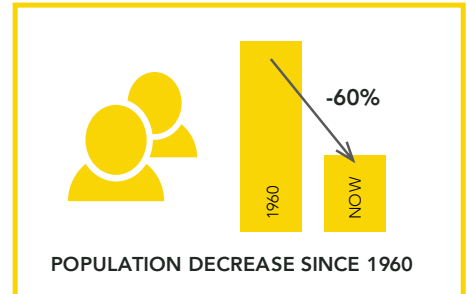

Our Impact

In addition to amplifying and accelerating the work of our impact partners, we also advance our mission through the development and implementation of several plans, programs and initiatives, including:

Anti-Displacement Tax Fund

An initiative that will pay qualifying homeowners' property tax increases in the English Avenue, Vine City, Ashview Heights and Atlanta University Center communities. The program is designed to help ensure that current homeowners are not displaced due to rising property taxes.

Land-Use Framework Plan

A design and implementation strategy — created in partnership with the City's Department of Planning & Community Development — to revitalize the Westside, building on the good work and extensive community feedback put into previous plans by city officials, partners and community residents.

Transform Westside Summit

Twice-monthly "town hall" meetings created to foster connection, collaboration and communication amongst community members around revitalization efforts.

Westside Neighborhoods Beautification Project

Pilot job training and placement program designed to help Westside residents carve out career paths while cleaning up and beautifying our four target neighborhoods.

Westside Volunteer Corps

Established to create opportunities for individuals from throughout Atlanta to join forces with Westside residents in the revitalization of the historic Westside. Through a variety of volunteer projects, the Corps works to strengthen community nonprofits and expand their impact with a consistent injection of human capital (i.e. volunteers).

Westside Community Data Dashboard

Dedicated to identifying and understanding the needs and opportunities that exist in WFF's four target neighborhoods. Site offers a baseline of community conditions and trends over the past 15 years against which WFF will track future progress.

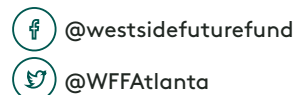

Progress from the Collective Effort

RODNEY COOK, SR. PARK IN VINE CITY



Stone retaining walls shape three terraced pools at the corner of Thurmond St and Walnut St. The terraced pools will play an important role in managing and improving the stormwater that will be collected from the 150 acres around the 16-acre Cook Park site.

Progress from the Collective Effort



PARK PRIDE

Park Pride, The Conservation Fund and Chattahoochee Riverkeeper are proud to announce that after nearly ten months of active construction, Kathryn Johnston Memorial Park is nearly complete! Kathryn Johnston Memorial Park is the latest addition to a series of parks we have built in partnership with the community throughout the Proctor Creek headwater neighborhoods over the past nine years. These parks reduce the impacts of severe stormwater flooding while transforming blighted lots into community assets. This park combines underground detention chambers, rain gardens and bioswales to capture an average of 3.5 million gallons of stormwater each year. Kathryn Johnston Memorial Park is transforming a vacant, fenced-off lot into an open, safe, and accessible greenspace for community use.

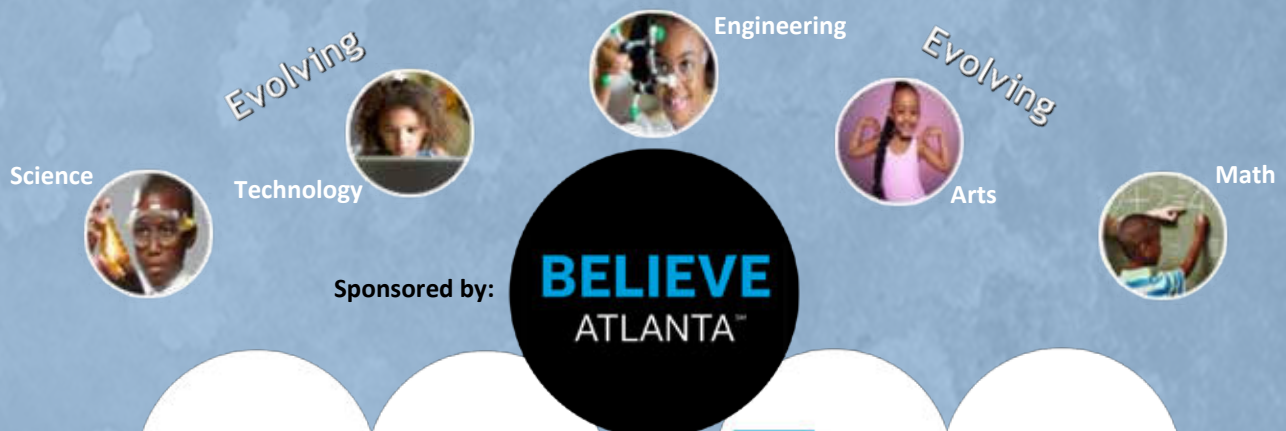

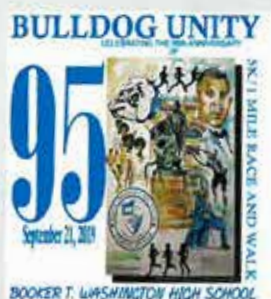

The Cute Shuttle will make scheduled stops at these locations on every 1st and 3rd Friday of the month:

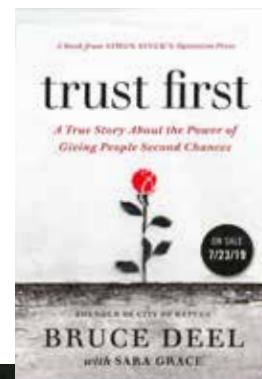

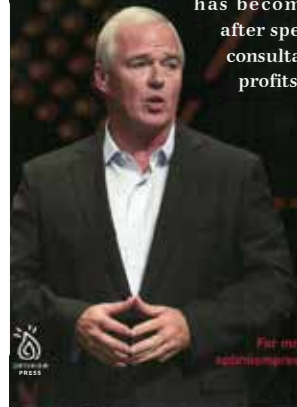

Creating the Beloved Community



The end is reconciliation; the end is redemption; the end is the creation of the Beloved Community. It is this type of spirit and this type of love that can transform opponents into friends. It is this type of understanding goodwill that will transform the deep gloom of the old age into the exuberant gladness of the new age. It is this love which will bring about miracles in the hearts of men.

Martin Luther King, Jr. from "Facing the Challenge of a New Age," 1956

The coining of the term, "beloved community" is credited to Josiah Royce (1855–1916), a Harvard professor, theologian, and philosopher, who taught at Harvard from the 1880s to 1910s.

Josiah Royce deemed the beloved community the "principle of all principles" and spoke of the beloved community as an ideal, separate from ordinary life, a spiritual community where all those "fully dedicated to the cause of loyalty, truth, and reality itself" were joined. Speaking from a distinctly Christian perspective, he stated that religious communities at their core should embody "the mystery of loving membership in a community." This participation was enacted through deep loyalty to a personal cause that one serves with "all [one's] might and soul and strength."

Royce wrote, "Find your own cause, your interesting, fascinating, personally engrossing cause; serve it with all [one's] might and soul and strength; but so choose your cause and so serve it, that thereby you show forth your loyalty to loyalty, so that because of your choice and service to your cause, there is a maximum of increase of loyalty among your fellow [human beings]."

Since you cannot find the universal and beloved community, create it.

One of Royce's students in the 1890s was W.E.B. Du Bois, who arrived in Atlanta in 1897 to establish a sociology program at Atlanta University and develop the university's curriculum. It is possible W.E.B. Du Bois and others could have discussed the idea of the "beloved community" and its embodiment in the Atlanta University Center and Vine City neighborhoods as early as Du Bois' arrival in Atlanta. Since the late 1860s, white and black educators, black students, and working class white and black residents had been living in the historic Westside.

Dr. King's mentor, Howard Thurman, was also a student of Royce and colleague of W.E.B. Du Bois. He used the term "beloved community" as an inspirational lens "to perceive [in the world] a harmony that transcends all diversities and in which diversity finds its richness and significance." He broadened the concept from Royce's specifically Christian orientation and emphasized the importance of truly integrated communities beyond legal integration and emphasized the importance of a radically nonexclusionary community.

During Thurman's lifetime, the historic Westside served as a nerve center of civil rights activism even as the effects of legal segregation remained in the community.

Community cannot for long feed on itself. It can only flourish with the coming of others from beyond, their unknown and undiscovered brothers and sisters.

Dr. King takes the thinking of Royce and Thurman forward with his belief that we can "actualize the Beloved Community." Walter Fluker writes that the "beloved community" is Dr. King's "single, organizing principle of [his] life and thought."

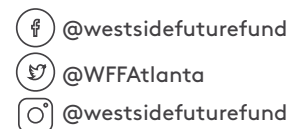
Our goal is to create a beloved community, and this will require a qualitative change in our souls as well as a quantitative change in our lives.
